Conservation Matters

The elusive dibblers of Dirk Hartog Island National Park

Over the past year and a half, 57 dibblers bred at Perth Zoo have been reintroduced to Dirk Hartog Island by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA). Dibblers are endangered and the fourth species to be translocated as part of the *Return to 1616* Ecological Restoration Project.



Whilst keeping track of the initially small numbers of these tiny carnivores is challenging, remote cameras have proved their value. Can you see the dibbler in the bottom right of the photo? It has been attracted to a lure that contains a bait specially formulated to attract small animals which is held in the white pipe attached to a post in the centre of the image. This photo was captured near their release site nearly nine months after the first release. It caused great excitement amongst the DBCA team as it was the first remote camera image of dibblers since their reintroduction.

More translocations are planned in the future in order to boost population numbers, so stay tuned for more news!
